<b>A Reader in Reception will...</b>	<p>experience:</p> <p>A range of fiction and non-fiction books. Activities to stimulate a love and an awareness of rhyme and alliteration. A print rich environment throughout the curriculum. Role play areas to develop stories further. Engaging and multisensory phonics sessions daily focussing on 44 phonemes and common irregular words. <p><b>A Reader in Year 1 will...</b></p>	<p>Know...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>some books are fiction, some are non-fiction</li> <li>the same sounds can be represented through different GPC</li> <li>how to read with more fluency and expression</li> <li>when words are repetitive in a text, join in with repeated refrains</li> <li>the main parts of a familiar story and how to retell</li> <li>titles and blurbs give information about the book</li> </ul> <p>Be able to...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>be secure at phase 5 phonics</li> <li>identify which words appear again and again</li> <li>reading CEW with some fluency and recognises unusual correspondences between spelling and sound</li> <li>re-reads if reading does not make sense</li> <li>re-tell with considerable accuracy</li> <li>discuss significance of title and events</li> <li>make predictions on basis of what has been read</li> <li>make inferences on basis of what is being said and done</li> <li>reads with pace and expression ie pause at full stop; raise voice for question</li> <li>explain difference between fiction and non– fiction texts.</li> </ul>

<b>A Reader in Year 2 will...</b>	<p>Know...</p> <p>the same sounds can be represented through different GPC, spelling patterns and alternative spellings to aid reading</p> <p>the main events in familiar and unfamiliar texts be able to talk about these confidently, including characters, plot and setting</p> <p>how to take account of punctuation to aid reading for meaning</p> <p>Be able to...</p> <p>Secure at phase 6</p> <p>Recognises and effortlessly decodes most CEW</p> <p>Comments on plot, setting and characters in familiar and unfamiliar stories</p> <p>Recounts main themes and events</p> <p>Comments on structure of the text</p> <p>Use commas, questions marks and exclamation marks to vary expression</p> <p>Read aloud with expression and intonation</p> <p>Reads age appropriate texts with fluency and confidence</p> <p>Recognise: Speech marks, contractions</p> <p>Identify past/present tense</p> <p>Use content and index to locate information</p>

Year 3	End Point for Year Group
<b>A Reader in Year 3 will...</b>	<p>know:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>become a confident, independent reader</li> <li>phonics and word-reading will shift their focus onto comprehension.</li> <li>that there are different words types when reading</li> <li>characters have different feelings, thoughts and motives through what they have read</li> <li>different representations of sounds that will aid flow of own reading</li> <li>how to read ahead and self-correct to aid fluency and understanding of own reading</li> </ul> <p>be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>comment on the way characters relate to one another</li> <li>reads age-appropriate texts at a speed which allows focus on understanding as opposed to decoding individual words</li> <li>self-corrects using the appropriate strategies</li> <li>recognises and effortlessly decodes alternative sounds for graphemes</li> <li>knows which words are essential in a sentence to retain meaning</li> <li>draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions</li> <li>recognise how commas are used to give more meaning</li> <li>recognise: plurals, pronouns and how used, collective nouns, adverbs</li> <li>explain the difference that adjectives and verbs make</li> <li>develop more confidence to read ahead when looking for clues to determine meaning</li> </ul>

Year 4	End Point for Year Group
<p><b>A Reader in Year 4 will...</b></p>	<p>know: -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>how to develop skills to become an increasingly fluent reader, phonics and word types</li> <li>how to building comprehension skills through, prediction, skim and scan techniques</li> <li>to use intonation when reading and taking on roles of different characters</li> <li>to use their phonics skills to tackle new words</li> <li>how to share own experiences and view on what they have read</li> </ul> <p>be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>read most words effortlessly at a speaking pace</li> <li>use knowledge of phonics, root words, suffixes and prefixes to determine pronunciation and meaning of unfamiliar words</li> <li>read further CEW noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in words</li> <li>give a personal point of view on a text</li> <li>re-explain a text with confidence</li> <li>justify inferences with evidence, predicting what might happen from details stated or implied</li> <li>use appropriate voices for characters within a story</li> <li>identify how sentence type can be changed by altering word order, tenses, adding/deleting words or amending punctuation</li> <li>skim and scan to locate information and/or answer a question</li> </ul>

<p><b>A Reader in Year 5 will...</b></p>	<p>know...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>how to read with pace and fluency, including variation in voice for different elements of speech</li> <li>how to summarise what they have read and make judgements, giving different views based on arguments and discussions</li> <li>how to compare two different texts familiar to them</li> <li>how to make notes that have the main points to create a summary.</li> </ul> <p>be able to...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>read at a reasonable speaking pace</li> <li>pronounce unfamiliar words with automaticity</li> <li>read most words effortlessly</li> <li>summarise main points of an argument or discussion within their reading and makes up own mind about issue/s</li> <li>compare two texts</li> <li>appreciate how two people may have a different view on the same event</li> <li>draw inferences and justify with evidence from the text</li> <li>vary voice for direct or indirect speech</li> <li>recognise: clauses within sentences</li> <li>use more than one source when carrying out research</li> <li>create a set of notes to summarise what has been read</li> </ul>

Year 6	End Point for Year Group
<p><b>A Reader in Year 6 will...</b></p>	<p>know...</p> <p>talk about the text they are reading and give own opinion on what has been read, discuss if elements are fact or fiction, and draw inferences from what they have read about characters</p> <p>how to explain the motives of characters and their actions giving evidence from the text, using abilities in skimming and scanning</p> <p>the meaning of words using the strategies and knowledge of word classes</p> <p>be able to...</p> <p>determine meaning of new words by applying knowledge of root words, suffixes and prefixes</p> <p>refer to text to support opinions and predictions</p> <p>give a view about choice of vocabulary, structure etc</p> <p>distinguish between fact and opinion</p> <p>appreciate how a set of sentences has been arranged to create maximum effect</p> <p>recognise: complex sentences</p> <p>skim and scan to aide note-taking</p> <p>make predictions based on details stated and implied</p> <p>draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions and justifying inferences with evidence</p>
